Dear SEND Community,

The sun is shining and the gardens are all in bloom. I hope as many of you as possible are enjoying the fine weather since we live in such a beautiful area. But with the fine weather, comes an important reflection that many of our children with SEND aren't able to access our communities and our countryside in the way their peers do. For some, this is due to anxiety and mental health needs that make participating in social activities really challenging. For others, activities or venues can be inaccessible. Our SEND Council of children and young people tell us that they don't want to go to a party with their dads (apologies to dads) but their friends instead. Our parents and carers tell us that the lack of accessible social activities for their children can hold the whole family back from participating in their communities. This can be isolating and stressful. We are committed to breaking down those barriers. This year, I hope you will see positive steps towards building inclusive activities and informing families about what already exists.

On the morning I'm writing this, the SEND Improvement Board became the SEND Local Area Partnership and members and advisors joined us from a wider group than normal. We agreed to make sure our strategy for SEND takes full account of the views of children, young people, parents and carers. The North Somerset Parent Carers Working Together (NSPCWT) and SEND and You (SENDIAS) representatives shared findings from their annual survey which made for difficult but crucial reading/hearing. As well as hearing about the challenges I've highlighted of being able to fully connect and belong in local communities, we heard about the difficulties children and young people are experiencing at school. In particular, we heard about those children who are experiencing emotional health challenges. There are an increasing number of children in this situation. We have committed to work with NSPCWT to understand a lot more about what they are experiencing and in which areas, so that we can work directly with the schools concerned. We know there is some very inclusive practice in schools so we also want to highlight where things are working well and why they are working well so that across the system, we can learn and grow.

The direct engagement we have with our members of the Children and Young People's SEND Councils does work very well. Extend Network Learning Academy (ELAN Muti Academy Trust) has its own SEND Council of primary aged children who have voted to do a piece of work to help other children improve their sleep. They have met specialists and done some research, and they are ready to embark on a campaign of video and visual advice. We hope to update you very soon on this. In the main Council, Members are working with our Principle Educational Psychologist Guy Clayton to break down some of the myths about Special Educational Needs, starting with Neurodiversity. Their

aim is to help improve the inclusivity of schools and settings. Inspiring stuff! I hope that later this year, we will be able to say more about this work.

Finally, I want to say to all of you taking exams right now, and to all the family, friends and teachers supporting you that we are thinking of you and wishing you the very best. I know this can be a really stressful time so remember this: you are your own, unique and beautiful blend of brilliant things and we are already so proud of you. Take it steady, look after yourself and look out for others. The holidays are just around the corner.

Improvement Board Update: Progress on SEND Support Services and Attendance from Anthony Webster, Head of SEND

The latest SEND Improvement Board meeting held in March provided valuable updates on several key areas of service delivery and highlighted positive trends across North Somerset's SEND provision.

The Board received a comprehensive update on the vital work that SEND and You SENDIAS (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information Advice and Support Service) continues to provide for families across North Somerset. Their ongoing support helps ensure that families can access the information and guidance they need to navigate SEND services effectively.

A significant portion of the meeting was dedicated to examining attendance data for children and young people with SEND across North Somerset. The board explored current trends and discussed collaborative approaches to improving attendance rates. One particularly encouraging insight was the positive impact of nurture-focused interventions on attendance figures. The data demonstrated that when nurture principles are embedded in support strategies, children and young people with SEND show improved engagement with education.

The board acknowledged the cross-system efforts to enhance the timeliness of Education, Health and Care (EHC) assessments. The improvements have been substantial:

- 36% compliance in 2023
- 63.2% compliance in 2024
- 89.6% compliance in January

This significant progress reflects the dedication and collaborative work taking place across the SEND team and partner agencies to ensure children and young people receive timely assessments and appropriate support.

The recent coffee transition morning, jointly hosted by the SEND team, NSPCWT, and SEND and You, was reported as highly successful. Families found the session both welcoming and informative, providing them with valuable guidance during important educational transitions. The SEND Improvement Board continues to monitor progress and work collaboratively to enhance services for children and young people with SEND across North Somerset.

Baytree School Update

Since it opened last year, the expansion of Baytree School in Clevedon has offered modern and inclusive facilities to children with profound and complex learning difficulties.

The building takes Baytree from a single site providing places for 72 children to two-sites offering around 120 school places, helping to address the growing need for SEND school places. It also provides adaptations inside the building with integral hoists for children with limited mobility, a hydrotherapy pool, sensory rooms and provision across a single storey for those unable to use stairs.

The new school building was delivered by North Somerset Council and project contractors Willmott Dixon and it is a bright, calming environment which is making a real difference in the lives of local children and families.

This fantastic achievement has been recognised by Constructing Excellence who have shortlisted the school in the 'client of the year' category at their annual awards. The category, which is decided by public vote, commends organisations delivering construction projects that navigate challenges and benefit wider community. We're really proud of what we have achieved at Baytree and are pleased to be shortlisted. [You can cast your vote and help us win the award here and select the Client of the Year tab.](#)

Brightspots Update

In Term 4, children and young people in care across North Somerset were supported to complete the Coram 'Brightspots' 'Your Life, Your Care Survey'. The survey was developed by Coram Voice in partnership with Professor Julie Selwyn at the Rees Centre, University of Oxford, to measure the subjective wellbeing of children in care and understand what they feel is important to have a good life.

This year, we have achieved the highest response rate that we have ever had – with 71% of children and young people having completed the survey, and 80% being presented with the opportunity. Our children and young people with SEND were supported to complete the survey in schools with either their Designated Teachers, the Virtual School Team or our Engagement and Participation Officers, and in residential settings with Key Workers and Support Workers. The results from the survey are really valuable, as they allow us to make meaningful, child focussed, service improvements – and so we are pleased that we have received responses from such a wide range of our children in care.

We look forward to receiving a report of this feedback from Coram Voice by the end of summer and intend to have produced plans for improvement that we can share with our children and young people in the autumn. We would also like to say a massive thank you to anyone who may have supported a child or young person with this survey!

We have recently launched a new parent/carer ideas group for our Children's Centres.

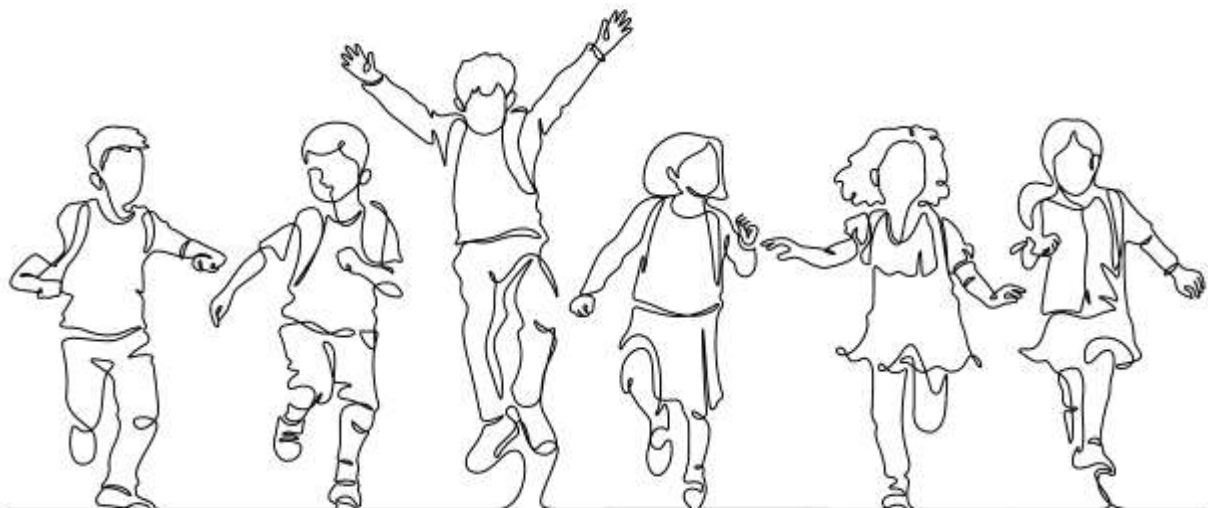
This group will allow us to work together to shape the future of our centres.

Trauma Informed Practice

I was lucky enough to be part of the latest Trauma Informed Practice training organised by the Virtual School and led by Dr Karen Treisman. The training lasted six days in total: two days in person in January, two days online in late February/early March and two days in person in early May. Over this time, I was joined by around fifty colleagues from the education community with a wide variety of roles but all with the same goal of learning how best to support some of our most vulnerable pupils. We formed a learning community of our own during this period and we learned a lot from each other as well as from Karen.

Over the course of the six days, we looked at a wide range of themes which relate to this complex subject area: relational and developmental trauma, the power of language, emotional regulation tools and skills, creative ways of exploring feelings and the importance of organisational culture. Karen provided lots of opportunity for us to explore ideas and themes within table groups and as a larger group. There was a good balance of theory and practice, and I came away with a much better understanding of the impact of trauma on child development and how children and young people who have experienced trauma can be best supported in our settings.

Karen was clear to emphasise that every child is unique and there is not one approach that will work for all children who have experienced trauma, but one theme shone brightly throughout the six days: the importance of relationships and connection. Key phrases were repeated to strengthen this point and will stick with me: 'Every interaction is an intervention', 'Being curious, not furious' and 'We can leave a heart print'.

In Karen's own words, 'At the heart of it all: relationships and connection. This work is human work. It's messy, thorny, layered, beautiful, and full of possibility- and it is through relationship that we repair, restore and grow.'

The training was extremely rewarding, and I will take this learning forward in my work and life. If you have the opportunity to attend any future training with Karen, I would grab the chance.

The Children and Young Persons' SEND Council came together in May for a highly engaging meeting, co-hosted by Broadoak School. Broadoak Academy were delighted to welcome Pip Hesketh, Guy Clayton, Anthony Webster, and Shelly Smith, alongside special guests Susie Weaver, Executive Lead for SEND at the Cabot Learning Foundation, and Assistant Executive Lou Coles. Attendees were warmly greeted—with some amazing pastries to start the day!

Language Matters: The North Somerset SEND Children's and Young Persons' Council Telling a different kind of story.

Over several years, our SEND Council has voiced concerns about the language used around Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). Words matter and for our young people, the term “disability” has often felt limiting, focusing on what they can't do rather than celebrating what they can. That's why we're proud to share the SEND Children's and Young Persons' Council's first official step toward change: the adoption of the term “different abilities” in place of “disability”.

This new term has not only been embraced by the SEND Council members but was also voted on by students across North Somerset. “Different abilities” reflects the unique strengths and potential of every individual, promoting a more positive and inclusive way of thinking about SEND.

This is just the beginning. The Council will continue to work on developing language that supports and empowers all children and young people in North Somerset. We're incredibly proud of their leadership in creating a more inclusive future one word at a time.

Talking About Different Abilities and Privacy!

Guy Clayton has been working closely with the SEND Council to talk about different abilities. They've had some great conversations about ADHD and Autism. Guy has shared lots of helpful information. You can read about in The Buzz magazine written and created by the SEND Children and Young Persons' Council.

As well as their work on language, the SEND Council also helped to write a new privacy policy which is easy for children and young people to understand.

Council members helped from start to finish. Shelly Smith visited several schools to ask children and young people what they thought. Their ideas and feedback shaped the final version.

Thanks to their hard work, children and young people in North Somerset now have a privacy policy that truly speaks to them which is clear, honest, and written with their voices at the centre.

The new privacy policy is as follows:

1. Who are we? We are North Somerset. We help families with children aged 0 to 19 (or up to 25 if they have special needs). We provide services like children's centres, family support, social care, adoption, fostering and more to help children grow and thrive.
2. Why do we keep information about you? We keep some information to keep you safe and provide the right support for you.
3. What information do we keep? We may keep your name, address, birthday and family details. We also have notes about visits, services you've used, or activities you've joined like libraries or events.
4. How do we collect it? We get information from you, your family and others like your doctor or school.
5. How long do we keep your information? We keep your information as long as needed to support you or as required by law. Some records stored longer for future access.
6. How do we use it? We keep it safe and only share it when necessary like with schools, courts or the police.
7. Your rights. You can see, fix or ask about your information on the North Somerset website.

Easter Holiday Highlights

SENDCAS had an exciting Easter Holiday, offering a programme of enriching activities and outings for young people with SEND. Each day was carefully planned to offer a variety of engaging, social, and creative experiences.

Complex Needs and Fun Days

Highlights of the Easter Holidays were the Fun Days and Complex Needs Days, held at The Firs Resource Centre in Weston-Super-Mare. These Days provided hands-on activities with an Easter/Spring theme, offering young people the chance to:

Saturday Club and Wicked Wednesday Offer

Our Saturday Club and Wicked Wednesday Club continue to thrive, offering young people carefully curated programmes in a safe environment alongside their peers. Recent activities have included creating Cookie Ingredient Jars and preparing ingredients for cooking and sharing meals together.

SENDCAS was delighted to receive some positive feedback from a parent regarding the provision our clubs offer. The parent shared:

She said, "It was such a pleasure to visit Westhaven School yesterday morning and meet the children who were enjoying the fun and food on offer as part of the HAF programme. The weather is beautiful and that certainly helps - as it's perfect for enjoying the wonderful outside spaces. But there are plenty of other activities inside - and places just to be quiet. A huge thank you to all the staff running the programme for their dedication and commitment - they enjoy it all as much as the children do ❤️"

Update from Sirona Care & Health

Autism Assessment Service: The neurodiversity pilot has been extended to the end of May 2025. Evaluation was completed in March and is being reviewed by the Neurodiversity key stakeholder group.

The ND pilot was conducted with some of the children on the Autism and ADHD waiting lists to review the potential positive impact of early identification of needs and support through neurodiversity profiling. 177 profiles have been completed across BNSSG including CYP who are EBSA and home educated. 39 of these were completed by the neurodiversity support team, and 138 by education staff. Concept paper 2 is currently under development and thanks for the recent NS deep dive on neurodiversity.

Children's Therapies: Children's OT and PT are at a crucial stage of their service review, writing new clinical pathways and support packages for children and young people. They are preparing to share with stakeholders in May for feedback before launching in September 2025.

SEND Training for Health Staff: Sirona is rolling out packages of essential SEND training to all children's services staff. With the correct level of training across our children's services we can continue to build on our knowledge and expertise, ensuring we have the right people in the right places, delivering care

Preparation for Sirona's SEND staff conference is under way. This event supports the training of staff in supporting children and young people with SEND. The team are in discussion with some excellent new speakers who we are sure will enrich the development of those attending and in turn the families and children we support

Public Health Nursing: As part of the service transformation, the School Nursing Service has developed group sessions for parents and young people on health-related topics such as vaping/smoking, healthy eating and a healthy bladder and bowel to compliment the one-to-one work with children, young people and families. The nurses are currently talking to schools to discuss how the groups will be arranged and the priority sessions for each school which forms part of the School Nurse/School Agreement.
